MR. E. B. AIMER.

The passing of Mr. E. B. Aimer, of Clonbern Road, Remuera, was that of one who was for many years well known in educational circles. Born in 1856 in Dundee, Scotland, he was educated at St. Andrew's under Dr. Patterson. He was later appointed to a position in the Clydesdale Bank, but being seized by the spirit of adventure he proceeded to New Zealand, arriving on the Fern Glen in the year 1879. He took up school teaching under Mr. Worthington at Wellesley Street, and for some years was connected with the Auckland Education Board, after which he joined the Native Department, and was appointed to Whirinaki Native School. After teaching at Northern Wairoa and Rotorua, Mr. Aimer retired owing to ill health.



On the outbreak of war Mr. Aimer offered his services to the Education Board, and was relieving teacher at Kawhia for four years. He was for many years an elder of Knox Presbyterian Church, devoting much time to church work. Of late years Mr. Aimer had been a staunch supporter of the Christian Science movement. He is survived by his wife and 10 children, all of whom are resident in New Zealand, with the exception of one. Lieutenant G. V. Aimer, F.R.C., died through an accident, while flying, and Private A. G. Aimer from war injuries. Other members of the family are: Messrs. K. W. Aimer (Auckland), R. W. Aimer (Waiuku), M. S. Aimer (Auckland), and Mesdames H. Dobie, W. J. Abbott (Melbourne), C. C. Forgie, Mrs. E. Roke (all of Auckland), G. MacKay (Dargaville), K. Connolly (Waiuku), and Miss A. L. Aimer. There are ten grandchildren.
