# Mr Frank Russell

## dead

bookseller, Mr Frank Science and Art examination, and Russell, died on Saturday in Dundee Royal Infirmary. Instruction of the first class certificate in the Education at 25 he won the Halley Medal in the first year of its presentation for general excellence in natural He was 84.

#### 30,000 books

In 1927 he opened a branch in the City Arcade known as The Bookshelf. Between both premises it was estimated he stocked some 30,000 books.

The Barrack Street shop was a treasure-house for the browser. It is to be kept on by the family and conducted by Mr Charles D. Petrie, who has assisted Mr Russell for many years.

Mr Russell was educated at Ann Street School and at evening classes in Harris Academy, going on to study natural science.

### Became manager

This extensive course of evening study took place while he served his apprenticeship as a bookbinder with William Kidd & Sons, Dundee. He joined as a message boy and became manager.

Later he was manager of Victoria Works (George Findlay) before opening his Barrack Street shop.

The previous owner was a minister, and the shop was stocked mainly with theological books, Mr Russell extended his stock to include varied subjects, especially

medical and technical, and the shop, like Topsy, "just growed." Mr Russell's customers included Ramsay MacDonald and Kreisler. Until his last illness he was off for only one day through indisposition.

He was an F.S.A. (Scot.) and an ardent church and mission worker. He was superintendent of the Sunday school in Princes Street Church for 25 years.

He had preached in 60 churches he was in charge of the Grove Street Mission, Dundee.

Mr Russell had been confined to bed for a month. He lived at 47 Princes Street, Monifieth, and is survived by his wife and two sons.

Russell's was crowded and spilling out on to the pavement.

In the midst of it all presided the snowy-haired proprietor, who sold books on every conceivable subject to pupils and students of all the city's educational establish-
